The Extractive Industry Transparency Initiative (EITI) is a global standard to promote the open and accountable management of oil, gas and mineral resources.

The Initiative aims to encourage countries to be more transparent in reporting the benefits they receive from their country's natural resources.

By publishing material information on payments and revenues, the EITI aims to promote the prudent use of natural resource wealth as an important engine for sustainable economic growth that contributes to continuing development and poverty reduction.

The Republic of the Philippines published its fourth PH-EITI Report covering 2015 and 2016 collections/ revenues to the EITI International Board in December 2017.

1. Budget

a. Details on budget

- Amount, recipient barangay

b. Planning of projects

- Projects, inclusion in identifying projects





c. Non- and/or poor implementation

d. Lack of sustainability

- Projects not continued when management is changed

2. Employment

a. Outsourcing

- Labor not from host and affected communities, proposal for a MOA



3. Damage (costs to environment and livelihood)

a. Safety

- Households near mine site facing environmental risks (e.g. landslides)

b. Livelihood

- Damaged farms



c. Damage on infrastructure

- Barangay roads severely damaged, posing safety issues



3. Selection

a. Scholarships, etc.

- Suggestions if non-CCC employees dependents can avail of scholarships
